

### Study of the Readings

### Background on the Gospel

Reading Matthew 18:21-35 Today's Gospel follows last week's Gospel in which Jesus taught the disciples how to handle disputes and conflict within the Christian community. In today's reading Peter asks Jesus how many times one ought to extend forgiveness to another. Peter proposes a reasonable number of times, perhaps 7, Jesus replies by extending Peter's proposal by an enormous amount: not just 7 times should one forgive, but 77 times. The parable of the unforgiving servant is Jesus' elaboration of his initial reply to Peter, where we come to understand the depths of God's

mercy toward us and the results of servant.
