

Background on the Gospel **Reading** Luke 1:1-4; 4:14-21

Today's Gospel combines two separate passages taken from Luke. First we hear Luke establish the purpose of his Gospel. We learn that Luke may have written to a specific person, Theophilus; but the word Theophilus may also be a general reference. In Greek, the word Theophilus translates as "lover of God." The Gospel then skips several chapters in which one would find the Infancy Narratives, Jesus' baptism by John, the temptations Jesus faced in the desert, and the beginning of Jesus' public ministry. In chapter four, Jesus is in his hometown of Nazareth, attending the synagogue on the Sabbath, which is said to be his custom. As Jesus stands in the synagogue, he reads from the
